Selection will focus on research that is interdisciplinary in nature and community-based. We encourage applicants to describe how will they will work with a community partner, or partners in a public agency; if applicants have not already developed such a partnership, we expect them to explain how they will do so with the help of this grant as well as how the partnership is critical to addressing the research question(s). Proposals may demonstrate work on the ground and should clearly explain the expected pathway for impact and scaling solutions. Priority will be given to students who are actively conducting fieldwork or planning to conduct field work.
